I have the honor to enclose a report from the Commissioner to the Five Civilized Tribes, dated November 4, 1907, transmitting for executive action an act of the National Council of the Creek Nation, approved by the Principal Chief on October 23, 1907, entitled:

An Act to provide for the continuation of the tribal government for the fiscal year ending December 4, 1908.

The act carries an appropriation of \$15,700, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for the payment of salaries of the various tribal officers and expenses of the offices of the Principal Chief and National Secretary. The Commissioner to the Five Civilized Tribes says the act carries the amount heretofore appropriated for these purposes and that by a separate act the offices of National Auditor, Superintendent of Public Instruction and Private Secretary have been abolished, and that if such act is approved the amounts appropriated for these three officers, aggregating \$2000, will, of course, not be expended.

The Acting Commissioner of Indian Affairs and the Commissioner to the Five Civilized Tribes recommended the approval of the act. I concur in their recommendation.

I have the honor to transmit a report from the Commissioner to the Five Civilized Tribes, dated November 4, 1907, forwarding for executive action an Act of the National Council of the Creek Nation approved by the Principal Chief on October 25, 1907, carrying an appropriation of \$1,400 in favor of the Presbyterian Board of Home Missions for the support and conduct of the Nuyaka Boarding School during the term of 1905-6.

The Commissioner to the Five Civilized Tribes reports that the Board of Home Missions has heretofore made claim for this amount, and that it was forwarded for the consideration of the Department with his report of July 12, 1907, in which he said that the Creek National Council had made an appropriation for the support of the school for the term mentioned and that the appropriation had been paid out in accordance with the usual practice. He did not feel justified in recommending that the claim be paid and suggested that the subject be referred to the Council, and that if an Act was

passed appropriating the amount in favor of the Presbyterian Board of Home Missions it could be considered. It appears that the Council gave the subject careful consideration and appropriated the amount mentioned in settlement of the claim, and the Commissioner to the Five Civilized Tribes reports that it has been customary for the Creek Nation to pay the Presbyterian Board of Home Missions \$5,600 per annum for the support of the school, payable quarterly from the beginning of the school year, which is in September or October; that the first three quarterly payments were made as usual; but that on account of the fact that the Department took control of the Creek schools in July, 1906, the last quarterly payment was not made.

As it seems that the Act carries an appropriation to pay a just and legal claim against the Creek Nation, I concur in the recommendations of the Acting Commissioner of Indian Affairs and the Commissioner to the Five Civilized Tribes and respectfully request that you approve the Act.

I have the honor to transmit a report from the Commissioner to the Five Civilized Tribes, dated November 13, 1907, transmitting for executive action an Act of the National Council of the Creek Nation, approved by the Principal Chief on October 26, 1907, abolishing the offices of National Auditor, Superintendent of Public Instruction, and private secretary to the Principal Chief, from and after December 4, 1907, it being set forth that these officers are no longer needed. The Act creates the office of Executive Interpreter, at a salary of \$1,500 per annum, to be selected or appointed by the Principal Chief, to serve from December 4, 1907. The Act recites that the Principal Chief is not sufficiently conversant with the English language to properly conduct the business of Chief Executive, and that consequently the services of an Executive Interpreter are required.

Among the papers is a communication from Cheesie McIntosh, Tribal Superintendent of Creek Schools, dated November 4, 1907, protesting against the discontinuance of the office held

by him. He says that section 10 of the Act of Congress approved on April 10, 1906, authorizes this Department to assume control and direction of the tribal schools and to conduct them under such regulations as the Department may prescribe. He also invites attention to section 3 of the regulations governing tribal schools of the Five Civilized Tribes approved by this Department on July 7, 1906, which provides that the present tribal school officers shall continue in office until otherwise directed by the Secretary of the Interior.

The Commissioner to the Five Civilized Tribes reports that there is no necessity whatever for these officers, but that he believes that the office of Executive Interpreter should be authorized. He recommends that the Act be approved and that Cheesie McIntosh be appointed by me as Tribal Superintendent of Schools, effective on December 4, 1907, at his present compensation, which is \$1,200 per annum, one thousand dollars being paid from tribal funds and two hundred dollars from the appropriation made by Congress.

The Commissioner of Indian Affairs concurs in the recommendation of the Commissioner to the Five Civilized Tribes. I also concur and respectfully request that you approve the Act.

The President:

There is inclosed an Act of the National Council of the Creek Nation, approved by the Principal Chief on November 6, 1908, making an appropriation of \$1500 to pay the salary of the Executive Interpreter, no item covering his services having been included in the act making appropriation for the expenses of the tribal government for the year ending December 4, 1909.

The official designated as Executive Interpreter is in addition to a regular interpreter, who receives \$1000 per year, but the Executive Interpreter acts as Private Secretary to the Principal Chief, and his services are needed throughout the year.

Thomas Ryan, Acting Commissioner to the Five Civilized Tribes, recommends the approval of the Act. The Department also recommends its approval.

WHEREAS, The National Council of the Muskogee Nation at its last Annual Session did pass a law creating the office of Executive Interpreter and providing a salary of Fifteen Hundred Dollars per annum for such Interpreter; And,

WHEREAS, The Principal Chief acting under the law did appoint Hon. G. W. Grayson as Interpreter and said appointment has been approved by the Secretary of the Interior as provided by law, therefore,

BE IT ENACTED BY THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF THE MUSKOGEE NATION:

That there be and is hereby appropriated out of the General Funds of the Muskogee Nation, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars in favor of G. W. Grayson as Executive Interpreter for the fiscal year ending Dec. 4th, 1909, to be paid under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Interior for the disbursement of Creek Funds.

The Indian Appropriation Act approved August 1, 1914, contains the following provision:

"That the Secretary of the Interior is hereby authorized to permit the Principal Chief of the Creek Nation to call a special session of the National Council of said Nation, and for said purpose there is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the United States to the credit of the Creek Nation, the sum of \$10,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the mileage and per diem of members and other incidental expenses of such council meeting upon the approval of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs: Provided that the Commissioner of Indian Affairs shall fix the time for calling said session of the council, the length of time said council may remain in session, and the amount that shall be allowed members attending."

While this office has received no official advice that authority has been wanted for the calling of the Creek Council in session pursuant to said provision, I have been verbally informed by Mr. R. G. Allen, National Attorney for the Creek Nation, that the Council is to meet September 1, 1914, for a period of 10 days.

As the Council members will desire their pay, if possible, by the time of adjournment, in order to pay hotel bills and other expenses, I recommend that the amount of \$10,000 from Creek tribal funds be placed to the credit of Mr. W. H.

Baker, Cashier, as soon as practicable after September 1st and before September 10th, and that he be authorized to pay warrants for the expenses of the meeting of the Creek Council, when issued by the Principal Chief and approved by Mr. R. C. Allen, tribal attorney. I am advised that Mr. Baker has made requisition for the money today, to be placed to his credit after approval of his new bond.



Sir:

I have the honor to transmit herewith as provided by Section 28
of the act of April 26, 1906, 34 Stats., 137, an act of the National
Council of the Creek Nation, approved by the Principal Chief, September
4, 1914, entitled,

An act making it an offense for any member of the National
Council to drink intoxicating liquors and fixing punishment.

This act calls attention to the demoralizing effects of intoxicat-
ing liquors and provides in section 1 that it shall be unlawful for
any member of either House of the Creek National Council to use, in
any form, any kind of spirituous, intoxicating, fermented or malt liquors,
wines or other beverages.

Section 2 provides that any member found guilty by the majority
vote of the House of which he is a member shall forfeit his office and
his successor shall thereupon be appointed by the Principal Chief from
the town represented by said member.

Section 3 provides that the act shall become effective from and

after its passage by the Council and approval by the Principal Chief.

I also enclose a communication from Moty Tiger, Principal Chief and R. C. Allen, National Attorney for the Creek Nation, dated September 21, 1914, submitting such act to this office and stating that the morning following the convening of the Council four of the members were detained in jail on charges of disorderly conduct, presumably resulting from the use of intoxicating liquors, which led to the introduction and passage of the act enclosed.

The act transmitted would seem to be chiefly for the information of your Office and the Department. However, should any members of the Council be found guilty under such act it might be considered necessary, in order to carry its provisions into effect, that the same be approved by the President, as section 23 of the act of April 26, 1906, provides that no act, ordinance or resolution, except resolution of adjournment of the tribal council shall be of any validity until approved by the President of the United States.

Section 6, Article 1 of the constitution of the Creek Nation, reads as follows;


"Each House shall judge of the returns and qualifications of its members, impeach a member for disorderly conduct and by the concurrence of two-thirds of both Houses expel a member. Neither House shall adjourn for a longer period than two days without the consent of both Houses".

The act transmitted does not seem to follow exactly the procedure as fixed by the constitution for expelling a member, although it may not be considered entirely inconsistent therewith. The provisions of the act appear to be opportune and its effects will undoubtedly be salutary and wholesome. There can be but little respect among the members of the tribe when members of its Council elected to represent the people are under the influence of liquor, while the Council is in session as has often been the case in the past. While the Council undoubtedly has had authority before to expel a member for drunkenness it undoubtedly will have a good effect to know that there is a specific enactment covering such offense.

The act is transmitted with the recommendation that it be submitted to the President for approval and that advice be given in due time of the action taken thereon.

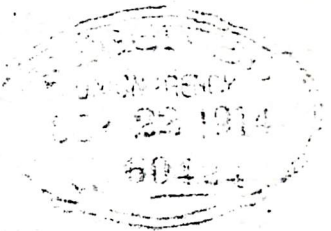

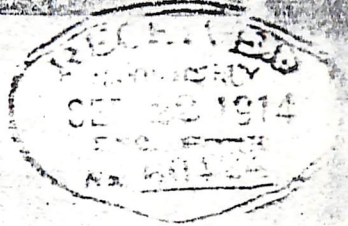

RESOLUTION.

WHEREAS, The present greatest foe, threatening the health, the wealth, the moral and social standing of the Indian race, the Demon operating upon the every fiber of his being, the effect of which is being to destroy his intellect, dethrone his reason, waste his estate, and in the end to consign him to a pauper's grave; and

WHEREAS, as Members of the Creek National Council, we represent, in our humble capacity, the places made vacant by the deaths of our ancestors; considered then, as we consider them now, honorable and high positions of great trust, entrusted by the masses of one of the greatest Tribes of Indians of all history; and

WHEREAS, We realize these things and further realize the splendid effort the Honorable Cato Sells, as Commissioner of Indian Affairs is making to prevent the sale of other disposition of intoxicants among us, and desiring to help him in this fight, and to otherwise set an example for our children to follow;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ENACTED:

Sec. One.

That it shall be unlawful for any member of either House of the Creek National Council to use, in any form, any kind of spirituous, intoxicating, fermented or malt liquors, wines or other beverages;

Sec. Two.

Any Member of the Creek National Council who shall have been found guilty by a majority vote of the House of which he is a member, shall thereby forfeit his office, and thereupon his successor shall be appointed by the Principal Chief from the Town represented by such member.

Sec. Three.

This act to become effective from and after its passage by the Council and approval by the Principal Chief.

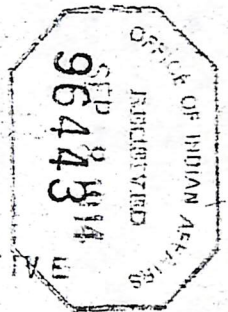

Sir:

By your office letter of November 4, 1914, I was advised that the Department had granted authority for the expenditure of \$50.00 by the Principal Chief of the Creek Nation, out of the \$10,000.00 appropriated by the Act of Congress of August 1, 1914, for the purpose of publishing the proceedings of the Creek Council.

I now have the honor to transmit herewith a communication from Mr. R. C. Allen, National Attorney for the Creek Nation, dated November 19, 1914, submitting the bill of the Indian Journal Printing Company of Eufaula, Oklahoma, in the sum of \$125.00 for printing one thousand copies of the proceedings of the Creek Council in both the Creek and English languages, a copy of such proceedings being attached to the communication.

Mr. Allen states that in compiling the proceedings of the council to be printed he left out all of such proceedings that were not of public importance, and delivered such proceedings as he thought should be included to Mr. C. W.

()

Grayson, Creek Interpreter, who interpreted the same into the Creek language, and secured bids for the printing of the same. A letter from Mr. G. W. Grayson, Interpreter, dated November 18, 1914, is also inclosed, in which he states that he received two bids for the work from printers in Muskogee, in addition to the bid of the Indian Journal of Eufaula. At the time my letter of October 17, 1914, with reference to the matter was written bids had not been received, and I stated in said letter that Mr. Allen had verbally advised that he did not think the cost would exceed \$50.00.

As the printed proceedings contain 64 pages, and is printed in both the Creek and English languages, I do not believe the charge of \$125.00 for one thousand copies is unreasonable.

I, therefore, recommend that the authority granted on November 14, 1914 - for the Principal Chief to expend not exceeding \$50.00 to have these proceedings printed - be modified so as to allow an expenditure of \$125.00 for such purpose.

Dear Mr. Tiger:

Reference is made herein to your communication of December 9, 1916, with which was submitted a resolution adopted by the National Council of the Creek Nation on December 7, 1916, in the matter of sending a delegation of three representatives of the Creek Nation to this city to assist the Principal Chief in the work of looking after the interests of the Creek people. You were requested by said resolution to submit the matter to the Secretary of the Interior with the request that a per diem and their necessary expenses be allowed said delegation, payment thereof to be made out of the funds of the Creek Nation.

It appears from your communication that you called the National Council of the Creek Nation to meet at Okmulgee on December 6, 1916 and that said call was issued with the understanding that the members of the council would not receive any pay for their attendance. It further appears that upon the passage and approval of the above resolution you appointed Samuel J. Haynes, Willie Brown, and Bunny McIntosh as the

By Section 25 of the Act of Congress of April 20, 1906, (34 Stats., 137-148), it was provided that the tribal existence and present tribal government of the Creek Nation should be continued in full authority and effect for all purposes authorized by law until otherwise provided by law, but that the tribal council or legislature should not be in session for a longer period than thirty days in any one year, and provided "that no act, ordinance or resolution (except resolution of adjournment) of the tribal council or legislature should be of any validity until approved by the President of the United States".

It was further provided in the Act of Congress of March 3, 1909, (35 Stats., 781-808), that the tribal council when meeting should receive compensation only for the length of time authorized by the Secretary of the Interior. In view of the above limitation as to the meeting of the tribal council it might possibly be held that the right was reserved to the Secretary of the Interior to grant authority for meetings of the tribal council and to say when and for what length of time such meetings should be held, and it may therefore be questioned whether the meeting of the Creek National Council on December 6 and 7, 1916 was properly called.

In view of the provision in Section 28 of the Act of Congress of April 23, 1906, it cannot be recognized that the resolutions of the Creek National Council passed at the meetings above referred to have any validity until approved by the President of the United States. Furthermore, there is a prohibition contained in Section 19 of the Indian Appropriation Act of May 18, 1916, (39 Stats.L., 123-148), against the expenditure of tribal funds without specific appropriation by Congress, except for certain purposes. The purpose referred to in your letter and the above mentioned resolution does not come within any of said exceptions. In view of said prohibition as to expenditure of tribal funds, the resolution of the National Council above mentioned is not one that should be submitted to the President for approval, as the per diem and expenses of said delegation cannot be paid from Creek tribal funds.

In view of the above, no recognition can be given to Samuel J. Haynes, Willie Brown, and Bunry McIntosh as a delegation representing the Creek Nation which might afford said persons any claim against said Nation for services and expenses under their appointment by you, as set forth in your letter.
